
Friends of the St. Clair River



Our Story // Friends of the St. Clair River staff have been getting their feet wet and hands dirty around Michigan's Thumb Coast for over a decade. That's thirteen years of pulling on waders, fighting off mosquitoes and ticks, maneuvering thorny bushes, hiking hundreds of miles, and handling the tiniest seeds and largest fish to restore the highest priority landscapes and streams. Since our inception in 2007, we have become the region's largest environmental nonprofit. Setting A Course For Success: 2020 Program Highlights

Friends of the St. Clair River's environmental stewardship and education programs are stronger because of the resources and assistance provided through our generous network. Because of your support, we can commit the energy and expertise necessary to partner with schools, families and communities to build programs that make a positive impact on people, plants and wildlife.



Remediated Pollution in the St. Clair River

We worked to understand community concerns of tap water that comes from the St. Clair River. The Area of Concern is closer to being restored because production of delivered water is protected from spills, so it meets safe drinking water parameters.



Restored A Healthy Habitat

We converted a former building and parking lot on the Blue Water River Walk to a thriving habitat by planting fifteen native trees with forty volunteers. Thank you to the project sponsors for helping add more life to this former industrial site: DTE Foundation, Community Foundation of St. Clair County, ReLeaf Michigan and Owen Tree Service.

Relocated Protected Animals

We took part in a mussel-moving mission on the Belle River to relocate 2,000 threatened and endangered native freshwater mussels. Mussels filter large amounts of water, are highly sensitive to environmental changes, and require clean water to survive.

Supported Bridge To Bay Trail Coordination

We tapped into an opportunity that is enhancing our ecosystems, corridors and recreation. Trails are a meaningful way we engage residents in stewardship of our natural resources, and they are tangible connections to the intangible, like conservation and sense of community.

Settled Into Our New Office

We moved in with the Marine City Chamber of Commerce which allowed us to get to know our watershed neighbors and support Belle River and Bridge To Bay Trail projects in Marine City.

Cultivated Student Scientists

We provided 630 fifth grade students acrosssix school districts with free Sturgeon Science School classroom programs. It's one thing to have students read about endangered wildlife, it's another experience entirely when they get to see the wildlife up close and personal.

Community Education

Watershed Challenge

We created a twelve-week challenge with thirty activities designed for participants to get their hands wet and boots dirty to learn, explore, share, and reflect on our watershed. Over 50 participants discovered what a watershed is, why they are important, and what they could do to protect water quality.

Mission: WET

We put these unique backpack kits in the hands of 25 local families to delve into the fascinating freshwater world of ponds, creeks, rivers and streams. Aquatic habitats are filled with intriguing life and the backpack helped families explore that diversity together. Discoveries included mayflies, dragonflies, caddisflies, water striders, snails, clams and more!

Covering More Ground With Community Science

With 837 square miles in St. Clair County to inventory and monitor, Friends of the St. Clair River staff can use all the help we can get. That's why we train volunteers to equip them with the knowledge to monitor and record data, and report their findings.

We use plants and animals as bio-indicators to assess the quality of our environment. Different species have different levels of susceptibility to pollution, so we get an idea of water quality by observing which species are present or absent.

We use this data gathered from citizen scientists to guide our management actions. The more information we have, the easier it is to prioritize where to focus our efforts and allocate the resources necessary to make the biggest impact.

Wetland Wanderings

We host summer exploration programs at Wetlands County Park for families to dig in the mud searching for macroinvertebrates --- the small aquatic insects part of the food chain. The wetlands are assigned a water quality score ranging from excellent to poor depending on the type and number of insects found. Our 2020 data showed an increase in species diversity and abundance and we continue to find species, such as mayfly, that prefer clean water.

Michigan Butterfly Network

Our butterfly monitoring program engages volunteers by assessing butterfly populations along monitoring routes in urban and natural areas. This helps us evaluate habitat quality and how land care practices are impacting our watershed because butterflies are indicators of ecosystem health. The results of monitoring the last five years indicate butterflies are thriving in most areas of the county with more than fifty species of butterflies identified.

Into The Wild: Land Stewardship

We take a proactive approach to land stewardship. Diverse communities of native plants and animals are more resilient to environmental changes, and by acting quickly, we can control invasive plants before they are established.

Our process includes inventorying habitats from the rural countryside to the urban shoreline to reporting existing and emerging invasive plant species, and prioritizing actions based on this carefully collected data.

Since our Stewardship Program was established in 2015, Friends of the St. Clair River has significantly increased our organizational assets. Building partnerships has expanded the scope of our work with new program areas like community engagement and restoration. It has also led to a larger environmental impact.

In 2020, our Stewards worked in small, socially-distanced groups making progress on digging, chopping and yanking invasive plants and cultivating native plants. The value of their work lies in their passion, knowledge and dedication. We saw volunteers step up whether it was pulling invasive garlic mustard, counting butterflies, moving endangered freshwater mussels, or cleaning storm drains.

The Stewardship Network Spring **Invasive Species Challenge**

We removed nearly 1,500 pounds of invasive species like Garlic Mustard and Dames Rocket spending over 130 hours in three St. Clair County parks.

Better Together

We partnered with the Blue Water YMCA "Y Togetherhood" volunteers on three occasions at the Blue Water River Walk to clean the trail and collect and sow native plant seeds.

Blueways of St. Clair

St. Clair County Metropolitan Planning

Commission is a champion for St. Clair County's Blueway Trail system and Michigan's first National Water Trail, the Island Loop. They took water trails from its infancy to a successful program with seventeen mapped water trails.

U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) Great Lakes Science Center

Under the guidance of Dr. Edward Roseman, Ph.D. Research Fishery Biologist, his team is responsible for the building and monitoring of three fish spawning reefs in the St. Clair River. This has enhanced the St. Clair River's habitat for several fish species, especially the Lake Sturgeon.

St. Clair County

Parks and Recreation Commission

They contributed funds to build the one-mile paved path along the Blue Water River Walk and purchase adjoining land to develop the new Wetlands County Park. They support habitat projects by providing maintenance and monitoring which ensures their long-term success.
